

This Valentine's Day, Newhouse Remembers Love Gone Mad

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 4 (SEND2PRESS NEWSWIRE) – Newhouse, a Kansas City domestic violence shelter, notes that Valentine's Day isn't all candy and roses for every woman. Instead, it's a grim reminder of the fine line between love and hate.



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“When David and I first started dating, he was so attentive, paid so much attention to me and I thought he was so caring. But then, after we got together, that attention quickly turned to jealousy, control and violence when I didn't do exactly as he wished.”

This is just one story from the 431 women who actually made it to Newhouse in 2008 in search of help for themselves and their 344 children.

Domestic violence isn't reserved for the poor or uneducated. According to the American Psychological Association, nearly one in three adult women experience at least one physical assault by a partner during adulthood. It could be your sister, your mother, your neighbor or your daughter.

Consider these facts:

* Women of all cultures, races, occupations, income levels, and ages are battered – by husbands, boyfriends, lovers and partners (Surgeon General Antonia Novello).

* Approximately one-third of the men counseled (for battering) are professional men who are well respected in their jobs and their communities. These have included doctors, psychologists, lawyers, ministers, and business executives (Massachusetts Coalition of Battered Women Services 1990).

* Battering is the establishment of control and fear in a relationship through violence and other forms of abuse. The batterer uses acts of violence and a series of behaviors, including intimidation, threats, psychological abuse, isolation, etc. to coerce and to control the other person. The violence may not happen often, but it remains as a hidden, terrorizing factor (FBI Uniform Crime Reports 1990).

* Four million women are abused by their husbands or live-in partners each year in the United States (USDoJ 2005).

* Violence by an intimate partner accounts for approximately 22-percent of violent crime against women (USDoJ 2006).

* 30-percent of women murder victims between 2001 and 2005 were killed by their spouse or intimate partners (USDoJ 2006).

Located in the urban core of Kansas City, Missouri, Newhouse is recognized as the oldest domestic violence shelter serving Kansas City's urban core.

* In 2008, Newhouse provided 48.5-percent MORE bed nights than in 2007, assisting 431 abused women and their 344 children for a total of 22,230 bed nights.

* Newhouse answered 6,820 hotline calls in 2008, an increase of 11-percent from 2007.

* There were 8 domestic violence homicides in Kansas City in 2008, up from 4 in 2007.

Typical costs to keep Newhouse operational include:

\$25	Personal hygiene products for one resident
\$50	Diapers for one infant for one week
\$99	Pays for one woman or child's night free from violence
\$125	Milk for two meals a day for one week
\$500	Household cleaning supplies for one month
\$2,500	Food for the shelter for one month
\$8,700	Hotline for one month
\$9,200	Utilities for one month.

Immediate shelter needs are: lotion, sanitary products, cold medicine, deodorant, and cell phones.
